Purpose / Course Description:

From Course Description Book: Students must complete one of these: (option 1) both U.S. History A and U.S. History B -OR- (option 2) both American Studies A and American Studies B -OR- (option 3) all A.P. U.S. History courses (A, B, and C). Students will learn about the American experience over time and space in this survey course. While learning about the facts, events, and significant developments, students must also learn to read critically, analyze and evaluate arguments, decide which positions, given the evidence, are more or less plausible, better or worse.

U.S. History A focuses on the following eras from Michigan High School Social Studies Content Expectations for United States History and Geography: Review of earlier study of United States History (Era 1, Beginnings to 1620; Era 2, Colonization and Settlement, 1585-1763; Era 3, Revolution and the New Nation, 1754-1800s; Era 4, Expansion and Reform, 1792-1861; and Era 5, Civil War and Reconstruction, 1850-1877); Era 6, the Development of an Industrial, Urban, and Global United States,

1870-1930; and the first portion of Era 7, The Great Depression and World War II, 1920-1945.

U.S. History B focuses on the following eras from Michigan High School Social Studies Content Expectations for United States History and Geography: The second portion of Era 7, The Great Depression and World War II (1920-1945); Era 8, Post-World War II United States, 1945-1989; and Era 9, America in a New Global Age.

Mr. Ellsworth's Course Philosophy: This course will be conducted in a safe atmosphere; harassment and bullying are NOT acceptable; encouragement and compliments are acceptable! You and I will endeavor to maintain a social contract, an agreement of behavior. You and I will work together to learn more about U.S. History. We will strive to improve ourselves, we will work to build a better community and, we will act in accordance with Comet PRIDE (positive, responsible, integrity, determined, engaged).

Topics, Concepts, or Units of Study:

U.S. History A's key concepts:

Time period between **1877-1917**, **Bridge to the 20th Century**: Changes on the Western Frontier, A New Industrial Age, Immigrants and Urbanization, and Life at the Turn of the 20th Century.

Time period between **1890-1920**, **Modern America Emerges**: The Progressive Era, America Claims an Empire, and The First World War.

Time period between **1919-1940**, **1920s & Great Depression**: Politics of the Roaring Twenties, The Roaring Life of the 1920s, The Great Depression Begins, and The New Deal.

U.S. History B's key concepts:

Time period between **1931-1960**, **WW II & Its Aftermath**: World War Looms, The United States in World War II, Cold War Conflicts, and The Postwar Boom.

Time period between **1954-1975**, Living with Great Turmoil: The New Frontier and the Great Society, Civil Rights, The Vietnam War Years, and An Era of Social Change.

Time period between **1968-now**, **Passage to a New Century**: An Age of Limits, The Conservative Tide, and The United States in Today's World

Textbooks Used and Other Sources:

The main text you will be studying is McDougal Littlell's *The Americans: Reconstruction to the 21st Century* by Gerald A. Danzer, J. Jorge Klor de Alva, Larry S. Krieger, Louis E. Wilson, and Nancy Woloch. We will be using this text and more sources, some of which are video, handouts, and my lectures.

Materials Needed & Supplies Suggested:

Be ready to learn and show me you are learning. Please bring a writing utensil and paper to class everyday. Please keep a folder for this class. (I can provide you with a manila folder.) In that folder, keep materials (notes, handouts, and whatnot) for this class.

Methods of Instruction:

You will be studying the history of the United States, and you will read the textbook, listen to me talk, take notes, participate in discussions, and do instructional activities. During the course, you will complete instructional activities (in-class assignments, writing prompts, online assignments, quizzes, tests, and/or other activities) by yourself, with a partner, in small groups, or as a class (as directed by me).

Evaluation / Grade Calculations -AND- Types of Evaluation and Assessment:

I will assign point values to instructional activities. The trimester grade will be determined by figuring a percentage based on the points you earn compared to the total possible points possible. Also note that the **trimester exam is worth 20%** of the final trimester grade.

During the course, you will complete instructional activities (in-class assignments, writing prompts, online assignments, quizzes, tests, and/or other activities) by yourself, with a partner, in small groups, or as a class (as directed by me). Typically each week, you will be asked to read a chapter from the textbook and to take notes on it (as homework). During the week, we will do a variety of instructional activities in the classroom. By the end of a typical week, you will need to have completed an online assignment for the chapter (as homework), and on most Fridays, you will be given a quiz that covers both the chapter from the textbook and the material covered in class from that week. Finally, there will be a cumulative final exam at the end of the trimester.

Points earned will be divided by points possible to determine a percentage that is translated to a letter grade using the table on the left. Also note that the **trimester** exam is worth 20% of the final trimester grade.

Assignment Expectations:

Near the top of anything turned in for points, you need to have your name and the class period you have this course. All work must be <u>legible</u>. Specifically, I want you to strive to learn more about U.S. history and show me you are learning. You also are expected to follow my standards of academic integrity (see below).

Late Assignments:

Practice good time management and plan ahead! **Primarily, I want you to learn and show me you are learning.** Secondarily, I want you to turn things in on time.

Classroom Procedures:

Student Responsibilities & Expectations: Maintain our social contract. Learn, and show me you are learning. Improve and build a better community. Demonstrate Comet PRIDE.

Consequences: Failing to meet these expectations may result in teacher warnings, parental involvement, and involvement of the school administration.

Passes:

At my discretion, you may use a hall pass during class, and only one student at a time. **Limit your use of the hall pass to only when it is absolutely necessary.** (Instead of using the hall pass, you should make good choices before school, during passing periods, at lunchtime, and after school.) You must have my permission to use the hall pass; you may <u>not</u> just take my hall pass and use it.

Cheating:

The act of obtaining answers or completing assignments in a fraudulent or deceitful manner. Disciplinary action will be determined by staff and administrators. Possible zero grade for assignment and possible inschool suspension (1 hour - 3 days).

Mr. Ellsworth's Standards of Academic Integrity:

- I will strive to learn, maintain our social contract, and demonstrate Comet PRIDE.
- I will do my work following the instructions given for it and using only the appropriate resources for it.
- I will do my own work. I will not copy what someone else has down.
- I have not received any information about instructional activities, assignments, quizzes, tests, or exams from a source other than directly from Mr. Ellsworth, and I will not provide any information about instructional activities, assignments, quizzes, tests, or exams.

You may consume FOOD & DRINK in my classroom so long as you are <u>responsible</u> with it and it is **not a distraction.** You may **not** have food or drink in my classroom if you are tardy to class.

The difference between QUIZZES and TESTS/EXAMS in Mr. Ellsworth's course:

Notes that you have created may be used on **quizzes** in my class. Notes may **not** be used on tests or exams in my class. You may **not** use the textbook for quizzes, tests, or exams.

Mr. Ellsworth's SPECIAL RULES for quizzes & tests:

SPECIAL RULE #1: You may take quizzes and tests when you are ready, but I only schedule one time during class time to take quizzes and tests. So, you do NOT have to take quizzes or tests when the rest of class is doing so, BUT you will have to schedule a time to make them up. The rescheduled quiz or test must happen before school (arrive in my room before 7:20 A.M.), per Mr. Ellsworth's availability -or- after school (arrive in my room before 2:52 P.M.), per Mr. Ellsworth's availability -or- during class on the next quiz or test day. Do not abuse this rule... it should be used rarely. However, if you're absent Thursday or multiple times, consider waiting to take the quiz. Also, if you forgot your notes, you may want to reschedule. LIMIT: You may not delay a quiz or test if you are already missing one (regardless of the reason it is missing; it doesn't matter if it is missing because of an absence or your choice to delay it).

SPECIAL RULE #2: NO RETAKES! Since I allow you to take quizzes and tests when you are ready, I do not allow retakes.

SPECIAL RULE #3: Once you start a quiz, test, or exam, you must finish it all in one sitting. I am happy to write passes if you need extra time, but you must complete quizzes and tests once you begin them. This means, for example, you may not start a quiz during class and then finish it after school.

SPECIAL RULE #4: You are responsible for everything that went on in class, EVEN IF YOU WERE GONE. This includes videos we watched in class. (I am happy to arrange viewings before or after school, but videos will NOT be lent to students to view at home.) So you may want to pick a classmate you trust to help fill you in on what you miss when you are gone. You must be proactive to learn what you missed.

Mr. Ellsworth's TECHNOLOGY POLICY: Use openly and appropriately.
